What's a Vertical Garden?

Vertical gardens -- think living walls -- are one of the hottest new garden trends and yet it's one of the oldest (have you ever grown a vine on a fence or trellis?). A vertical garden is a perfect solution for just about any garden -indoors or out.

Vertical garden elements can draw attention to an area or disguise an unattractive view. In a vertical garden, use structures or columnar trees to create vertical gardening rooms or define hidden spaces ready for discovery. Trellises, attached to the ground or to large containers, allow you to grow vines, flowers, and vegetables in a vertical garden using much less space than traditional gardening requires.

Vertical gardening with upright structures can be a boon for apartment dwellers, small-space urban gardeners, and disabled gardeners as well as for gardeners with large, traditional spaces. (Information from Better Home & Gardening).

Check out websites and find a lot of ideas. You might create a vertical garden from a recycled ladder, and up-cycled dresser, crates, pallets, picture frames, trays, or stacked pots. The possibilities are endless.

January Gardening Tips

Hopefully many of you found under your Christmas tree some garden art and some magazines or books with landscaping ideas. Now you can cuddle up in that warm robe you also received and enjoy the cold days ahead. We don't even mind a snow day once in awhile this month as we think about those little birds and chipmunks that might be looking for a hand-out.

Removing the decorations from outdoors will not be too pleasant when the temps are below freezing. Maybe you were lucky enough to find gloves and heavy socks under your tree also. Get the hat, scarf, and wire cutters. Move quickly. Have hot chocolate ready to enjoy once indoors.
