## Greetings from our AFGC President, 2019-2021

Greetings to my fellow gardeners,

I can hardly believe that it is September and that fall is quickly approaching. Have you thought about saving your seeds? It really is as easy as one, two, three!

Step One – Decide which plants you would like to collect seeds from such as marigolds or zinnias. Wait until the flowers have faded and the seeds have turned black or the pods have opened. Lay them out to dry completely for a few days.

Step Two – Time to clean the seeds! If they come from a pod, usually no cleaning is necessary. If the seeds still have flower parts or chaff, you have to separate the seeds from the chaff. Tip - you can rub tough or small seeds between two pieces of wood.

Step Three- Separate and Store! Separate large seeds by hand. Smaller seeds can be placed in a plastic bag. As you shake the bag, you will see the seeds sinking to the bottom. Store your seeds in an air-tight container or plastic bag. Remember to keep them in a cool, dry, and dark area.

The Arkansas Flower and Garden Show has been cancelled for 2021. Our Flower Show committee is working on ideas for the AFGC flower show. There is a possibility that it will be held in conjunction with our annual convention in April. The NW District will be hosting the event in Conway. We will keep you posted.

I hope all of you are staying healthy and safe. Please stay in touch with your club members. Have you thought about using one of the program ideas listed in *The Arkansas Gardener* for a meeting? The suggestion for September gives directions for creating a terrarium. Please share your ideas and the creative ways in which you are conducting meetings. We learn so much from one another. #### 9/11 GARDEN IN ST. LOUIS



Visit this beautiful garden at National Garden Clubs Headquarters in St. Louis, Missouri. The September 11<sup>th</sup> Memorial Garden is located at the end of the wall extending from Kellogg Hall. The 16-foot-wide garden incorporates a number of symbolic meanings, representing the sites where so many fellow citizens, as well as individuals of other countries were killed on September 11, 2001. A low, pentagon-shaped hedge of Green Velvet boxwood surrounds two flagpoles representing the twin towers of the World Trade Center and a slightly higher hedge in the form of the Pennsylvania keystone. The area between the two hedges is planted with massed annuals.

This garden is a beautiful and fitting memorial of all who lost their lives on that terrible day and will assure that they are never forgotten. The garden was made possible by the generous support of the members of National Garden Clubs, Inc. The dedication on May 16, 2004, was part of the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration of National Garden Clubs during their annual convention held in St. Louis.

A visit to St. Louis is not complete without a tour of the Missouri Botanical Gardens. NGC Headquarters is located on 6.2 acres adjacent to the botanical gardens. So a full day could be spent in this area enjoying gardening at its best.

#### 12 BEST FRAGRANT INDOOR PLANTS

'Crown Jewel' Gardenia, (pictured above) place near bright light near S, E, or W window

'Arp' Rosemary, avoid overwatering

'Fudingzhu' Sweet Olive, place near S, E, or W window

Azores Jasmine, place near southern-facing window

'Marino Blue' Heliotrope, flowers year-round

Spearmint, place near sunny window

Night Blooming Jasmine, near sunny southern window

'Silverdrop' Eucalyptus, high light near sunny southern facing window

Corsican Mint, near sunny window

Lemon Balm, near bright light

'Bandera Purple' - Spanish Lavender, need high light

Lily of the Valley, enjoy inside then plant outdoors in spring
